To help New Americans achieve self-sufficiency and full membership in American life.


#### **Our Programs**

We support individuals and families as they begin a new life in a new home and community, through:

- > Refugee Services Welcoming and basic needs
- > Workforce Development Training and entry into the New American workforce
- > Education Language learning and college preparation
- > Immigration and Citizenship Paving the pathway to citizenship
- > Advocacy Educating the community about immigration and New Americans

#### Our History

Throughout its nearly 100-year history, the International Institute of Minnesota has offered innovative programs to meet the changing needs of Minnesota's immigrants. Founded in 1919 as a branch of the YWCA of Saint Paul, the Institute addressed unmet needs of immigrant women and their families by providing support services as well as English and citizenship classes. In 1974, the Institute began offering resettlement services as part of a new federal program to resettle refugees. Since then, the Institute has welcomed more than 28,000 refugees to our community.



#### LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



We all play a part in creating a new home and a new future for those who have been displaced.

With an unprecedented 21 million refugees awaiting the opportunity to begin a new life, **our work is more critical than ever.** 

During this time when intolerance and misinformation caused some in our country to look the other way, you have responded with open hearts. Thanks to you, in 2016 the Institute resettled 578 refugees, a 24% increase over the previous year. These individuals came to the United States from 12 countries – the majority (74%) arriving from Somalia and Burma.

With your generous support we continue to provide language learning, employment training, citizenship services and a celebration of cultural traditions, all offering New Americans a strong start to a new life – **a benefit to all Americans**.

In 2016, we introduced new services to address the elevated healthcare needs of refugees. We also became the only provider of social services for foreign-born adult victims of human trafficking in the seven-county metro area, and throughout most of Greater Minnesota. This new program provides emergency and stabilization assistance for individuals who have been victimized by sex trafficking, labor trafficking or both.

This year, social media enabled us to communicate with a global audience and increase our fundraising in service to New Americans. One of our website posts asked for support for incoming refugees. The post was shared broadly, and individuals throughout the United States answered with their generosity.

As we look ahead, we know that every one of us can play a role in supporting the success of New Americans in the United States and **your contributions make a difference**. Thank you for your continuing support to those seeking safety, a better life, and a place to call home.

### **2016 AT THE INSTITUTE**

Together, we provided the following programs and services in collaboration with our students, clients, staff, volunteers and partners.

#### **Refugee Services**

- 578 refugees from 12 countries were resettled in a new home many reuniting with their families after years of separation
- 34 survivors of human trafficking received emergency and stabilization assistance
- 82 New Americans improved their health with healthcare navigation services through the New American Healthcare Initiative

#### Career Pathways and Workforce Development

• 267 New Americans were employed thanks to job training and employment services. The majority were enrolled in the Institute's hotel hospitality and medical careers training programs.

#### Education for New Arrivals and College-Bound

- 1253 students enrolled in Institute education classes
- 354 students attended English for Work and English as a Second Language classes
- 98 college-bound students attended college readiness classes and moved toward college
- 60 individuals attended citizenship classes

#### Immigration and Citizenship

- 1259 citizenship applications were completed and filed with immigration services
- 1099 New Americans received immigration services, including assistance applying for permanent residency, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) and travel documents
- 24 unaccompanied minors detained at the border were reunited with family or close friends in the U.S.



#### Volunteering At The Institute

Volunteers are essential to fulfilling the mission of the Institute. New Americans are eager to meet Americans and Americans are eager to support their transition to their new home.

In 2016, 607 volunteers donated thousands of hours of service to New Americans as tutors, employment coaches, classroom assistants, bus buddies, refugee mentors and more.

Your time, care and generosity provide encouragement when times are difficult and a supportive, welcoming community where New Americans can thrive. Thank you for your commitment to our success.


